ANTHROPOLOGY

AP/ANTH 2170 6.00A SEX, GENDER AND THE BODY

<u>Term</u>: S1 Term: May 4 – June 15, 2020 <u>Time</u>: Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday & Thursday, 11:30am-2:30pm Course Credit Exclusion: Prior to Summer 2013 - AP/ANTH 2170 3.00

This course critically examines popular explanations of what is considered natural (and what is not) about sex, gender, emotions and the family. Through a cross-cultural approach, biological models of natural gender roles, as well as sexual and familial relations, are explored and questioned.

AP/EN 4011 3.00A QUEER THEORY

<u>Term</u>: S2 Term: June 22 – August 5, 2020 <u>Time</u>: Tuesday & Thursday, 2:30-5:30pm

What is queer? Is queer always contaminated by sexuality? How is "queer" different from "gay"/"lesbian"? This course will consider the historical conditions for the emergence of queer theory and the intellectual/political/cultural uses of and stakes in queer theory.

AP/EN 4192 3.00A

GAY MALE LITERATURE <u>Term</u>: SU: May 4 – August 5, 2020 Time: ONLN (Fully Online)

This course examines literature which is by or about gay males. Please consult the departmental supplemental calendar for a detailed course description.

AP/HREQ 1920 6.00A MALE-FEMALE RELATIONSHIPS

<u>Term</u>: SU Term: May 4 – August 5, 2020 <u>Time</u>: Tuesday & Thursday, 2:30-4:30pm (plus 8 tutorials) <u>Note I</u>: This course has been approved in the Faculty of Liberal Arts & Professional Studies for general education credit. <u>Note II</u>: This course will not count for major credit in HREQ. **PRIOR TO FALL 2009**: <u>Course Credit Exclusion</u>: AK/SOSC 1920 6.00

This course explores some of the basic issues which influence male-female relationships and experience in Western society. Property, sexuality, socialization and culture are considered with attention to the social science literature in these areas as well as contemporary expressions in male-female relationships.

AP/HUMA 1950 6.00A CONCEPTS OF MALE AND FEMALE IN THE WEST

An examination of the origins of, and the interrelationships among, gender, male and female concepts and roles through myth, literature, art and artifacts from various Western cultures, past and present.

AP/3693 3.00M THE RAINBOW LIST

<u>Term</u>: S2 Term: June 22 – August 5, 2020 Time: Tuesday & Thursday, 11:30am-2:30pm

Each year, the Rainbow Project Committee announces its annual Rainbow List. These titles reflect significant gay, lesbian, bisexual, trans-gendered and queer-questioning (GLBTQ) experience for young people from birth to age 18. This course analyzes some of that literature in addition to other expressions and representations of GLBTQ children and youth (film, television, digital media, music, etc.) in a variety of child-centred socio-cultural contexts. Note: Priority will be given to Children's Studies and Humanities majors and minors.

AP/HUMA 4816 3.00M WOMEN IN ISLAMIC LITERATURES

<u>Term</u>: S1 Term: May 4 – June 15, 2020 <u>Time</u>: BLEN (Partially On-line)

The course focuses on the representation of Muslim women in modern Islamic literatures (novel and short stories) and other forms of Islamic cultural production, such as photography and film.

<u>Term</u> S2 Term: June 22 – August 5, 2020 <u>Time</u>: Monday & Wednesday, 3:00-6:00pm <u>Note</u>: A knowledge of feminist theory is required. A knowledge of feminist theories of the body is an asset.

Students will become familiar with feminist and post-colonialist theories of embodiment and use them to explore how the fat body and fat phobia have been and are produced through history, through policy, and through popular culture.
